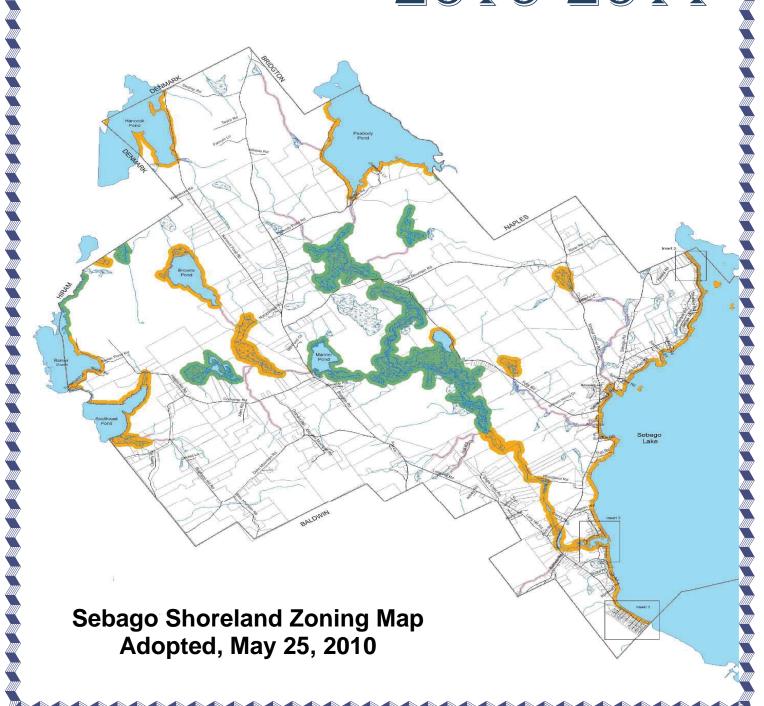


TOWN OF SEBAGO ANNUAL REPORT 2010-2011

BEVERLY COX



Beverly Cox served 23 years as Sebago Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Treasurer and Registrar of Voters, from 1975 to 1998. Beverly was active for years in many community organizations as well, including the Food Pantry, the Fire Department Ladies Auxiliary, Sebago Days, the North Sebago United Methodist Church and the Potter Academy Alumni Association. In her spare time she coordinated fire calls to the Town's fire department with the "red phone" and later by two-way radio.

RICHARD COX



Richard Cox has been an active volunteer and employee for the Town. He worked at the Town Landfill for 11 years, from 1974 till 1985. He was elected Assistant Fire Chief in 1981 and served in that position for 2 years until elected Fire Chief. He served in that capacity until 1987. Richard was active in coordinating events at Sebago Days for many years. He and his wife Beverly of 65 years, and their family, have lived in Sebago since 1970.

MICHAEL FOYE



Mike was a charter member of the Sebago EMS. He joined the Sebago Fire Department in 1971 and operated the first rescue vehicle in town, a used Pontiac hearse. Mike brought with him 22 years of experience in the US Army Reserve as a Medic. He became the first Sebago Rescue Chief in 1977 and held that position until 1984, later serving for 8 years as Assistant Chief. Mike was active with Sebago Fire and EMS for 40 years, retiring at the end of 2011. He was the Principal of Sebago Elementary School for 27 years, from 1971 until 1998, a Sebago Selectman from 1980 till 1984,

a member of the Budget Committee for 8 years, Moderator at Town Meeting, and chair of the 1976 Bicentennial/sesquicentennial celebration. He and Billy Nason started Sebago Days in 1979 and Mike has been active every year since.

Dear Friends:

I want to thank you for the opportunity to extend my warm greetings to the people of Sebago, and take just a moment to offer a few thoughts about the past year as we look ahead to the year to come. Indisputably, as we continue to face historic challenges as a nation, as a state, and as individual towns and cities, our economy remains of paramount concern, and justifiably so, as we are still plagued by the worst economic downturn since World War II. Indeed, as countless Mainers have conveyed to me in roundtable discussions and on Main Street tours, the crushing job creation drought that too many have endured for far too long must not become the new normal.

I share that frustration and anger. And I hope you will work with me to forge a brighter future worthy of the greatest nation on Earth, bearing in mind as we move forward that economic and homeland security cannot be mutually exclusive. In that light, we remember today – and every day – the extraordinary service and sacrifice of our brave servicemen and women in Iraq, Afghanistan, and around the world who comprise the finest defense force on the planet.

Dear Friend,

I hope this letter finds you and your family well. It continues to be an honor to represent you, and I wanted to take a moment to share with you some the work I've done in Washington and Maine over the last year.

As you know, times are not easy. The country still struggles to recover from the recession, which is why I'm so frustrated Congress has not been serious about job creation. Voters elected us to Congress with the highest priority of getting the country back to work. While we should have been voting on jobs legislation, we have ended up debating anything but.

I am proud, though, to have worked on my own piece of jobs legislation in 2011. Local food is a growing part of Maine's economy and has helped revitalize a traditional staple of our communities—the family farm. We have seen incredible increases in CSA farm shares, farmers markets, and acres in cultivation.

But outdated federal policy hasn't done enough to support this bright spot, and often hinders it. I've introduced the Local Farms, Food, and Jobs Act to bring local farmers the resources they need to continue growing. If passed, it means investments in our regional food infrastructure, help for local schools to buy food produced in their communities, and giving more and more people affordable access to local food.

Another piece of legislation I introduced in 2011 would help service members who are victims of military sexual assault. This has become an alarming problem as thousands of women—and men—report being sexually assaulted while serving. I've listened to many of them who are from Maine. My legislation would ease the restrictions they currently face to get disability benefits from the VA.

As a member of the House Armed Services Committee, I've been able to work on several polices that affect our military personnel. It also means that I've kept close watch on our operations overseas. In 2011, we saw some good news on this front. First, we finally found and killed Osama bin Laden. The second came with the official end to the war in Iraq.

I am so glad that the Mainers who have served there will be able to return home. But we can't forget the nearly 4,500 soldiers we lost in Iraq—24 of them from Maine—nor the men and women who continue to serve in Afghanistan. I hope we can start to bring them home in 2012.

My thoughts now are also with the many Maine families who can't afford to heat their homes. I'm disappointed to see deep cuts in LIHEAP, a program thousands of Mainers rely on. I've introduced legislation to restore the funding and I will keep fighting to get Mainers the support they need.

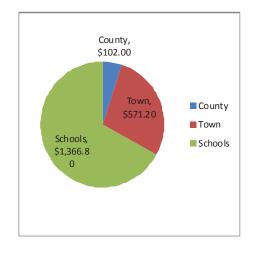
HOW ARE MY TAX DOLLARS SPENT?

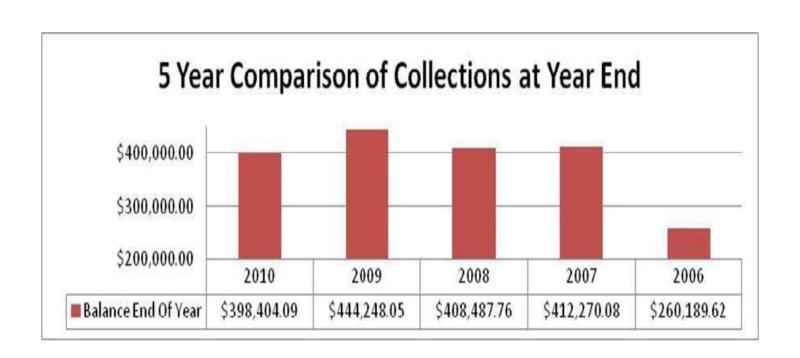

MANAGEMENTS DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS (UNAUDITED) June 2011

As Deputy Treasurer of Sebago, I offer the readers of the Town of Sebago's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Town of Sebago for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011. I encourage the readers to consider the information presented here in conjunction with the financial statements presented.

This annual report consists of a series of financial statements. The Statement of Net Assets (Statement 1) and the Statement of Activities (Statement 2) provide information about the activities of the Town as a whole and present a longer-term view of the Town's finances. Fund financial statements start with Statement 3. For governmental activities, these statements tell how these services were financed in the short term as well as what remains for future spending. Fund financial statements also report the Town's operations in more detail than the government-wide statements by providing information about the Town's most significant funds. The remaining statements provide financial information about activities for which the Town acts solely as a trustee or agent for the benefit of those outside of the government.

REPORTING THE TOWN AS A WHOLE

The Statement of Net Assets (Statement 1) and the Statement of Activities (Statement 2)

The Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities report information about the Town as a whole. These statements include all assets and liabilities using the accrual basis of accounting, which is similar to the accounting used by most private-sector companies. All of the current year's revenues and expenses are taken into account regardless of when cash is received or paid.

These two statements report the Town's net assets and changes in them. You can think of the Town's net assets - the difference between assets and liabilities - as one way to measure the Town's financial health, or financial position. Over time, increases or decreases in the Town's net assets are one indicator of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating. You will need to consider other non-financial factors, however, such as changes in the Town's property tax base and the condition of the Town's infrastructure, to assess the overall health of the Town.

In these government-wide statements, the Town's activities are reported in one category:

Governmental activities - Most of the Town's basic services are reported here, including fire, general administration, roads, and recreation. Auto excise taxes, franchise fees, fines, state revenue sharing and state and federal grants finance most of these activities.

REPORTING THE TOWN'S MOST SIGNIFICANT FUND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The fund financial statements provide detailed information about the significant funds, but not on the Town as a whole. Some funds are required to be established by State law and by bond covenants. However, the Board of Selectmen establishes many other funds to help it control and manage money for particular purposes.

Governmental funds - The Town's basic services are reported in governmental funds, which focus on how money flows into and out of those funds and the balances left at year-end that are available for spending. These funds are reported using an accounting method called modified accrual accounting, which measures cash and all other financial assets that can readily be converted to cash.

The governmental fund statements provide a detailed short-term view of the Town's general government operations and the basic services it provides. Governmental fund information helps you determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the Town's programs. We describe the relationship (or differences) between governmental activities (reported in the Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities) and governmental funds in reconciliation at the bottom of the fund financial statements.

Governmental Activities

To aid in the understanding of the Statement of Activities some additional explanation is given. Of particular interest is the format that is significantly different than a typical Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance. You will notice that expenses are listed in the first column with revenues from that particular program reported to the right. The result is a Net (Expense)/Revenue. The reason for this kind of format is to highlight the relative financial burden of each of the functions on the Town's taxpayers. It also identifies how much each function draws from the general revenues or if it is self-financing through fees and grants.

This table identifies various revenue streams that are included in the Charges for Services amounts on Statement 2 – Statement of Activities.

General Government Charges for photocopies, maps, building permits, plumbing

permits, cable TV franchise fees, gas tax refund, grants and

clerk fees.

Public Safety Dispatching services agreement with Standish, other grants,

dog license fees

Public Works Urban/Rural Initiative program,

Cultural and Recreational General assistance state reimbursement, parks and

recreational fees and donations.

All other governmental revenues are reported as general. It is important to note that all taxes are classified as general revenue even if restricted for a specific purpose.

The assets of the Town of Sebago exceeded its liabilities at the close of the most recent fiscal year by \$4,969,983 per Statement 1 (Net Assets). Of this amount, \$1,900,492 (unrestricted net assets) may be used to meet the Town's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors. The Town's total net assets increased by \$206,673.

As of the close of the current fiscal year, the Town of Sebago's governmental funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$2,890,014, an increase of \$393,108. Of this, \$1,660,275 is available for spending at the Town's discretion (unreserved fund balance) in the general fund. At the end of the current fiscal year, the net change in fund balance of the general fund was \$206,673 or (4%) of total general fund expenditures.

2011 REVENUES BY SOURCE

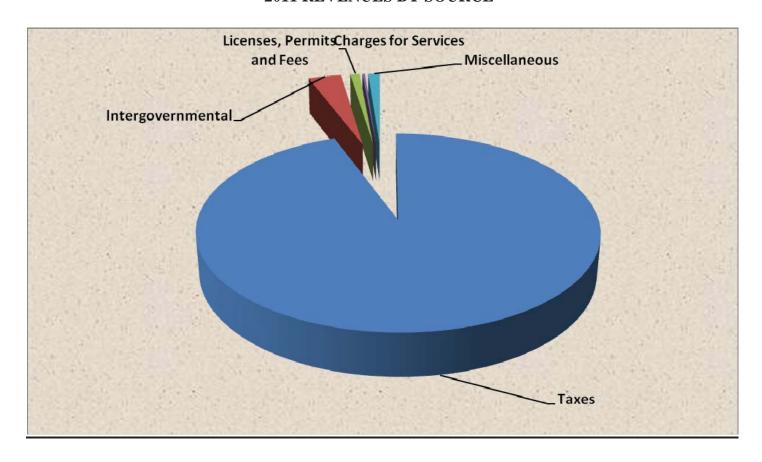


Chart A – 2011 Revenues by Source

2011 EXPENDITURES BY FUNCTION

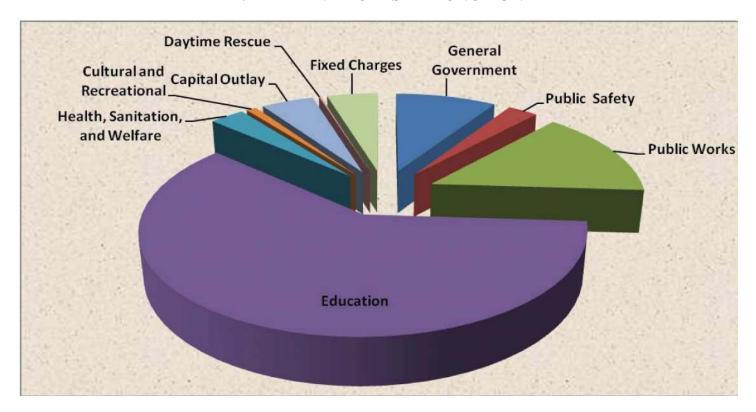


Chart B - 2011 Expenditures by Function

Analysis of Overall Financial Position and Results of Operations

Sebago's revenues exceeded expenses by \$206,673, as expenses were carefully controlled and revenues exceeded expectations.

- Taxes and excise collections were stronger
- Local Road Assistance funds were higher
- More building and plumbing permits were is sued

Factors which affected a decrease in expenditures are as follows:

- General government was down \$20,367.
 - ✓ Employee Benefits (due to a resignation)
 - ✓ Lower Worker's Compensation Rates
 - ✓ Lower premium for property and causality insurance

Other areas which saw a decrease in expenditures were Public Safety and Health, Sanitation and Welfare.

Analysis of Significant Individual Fund Balances, Transactions and Changes in Fund Balance

The Town finished the year with a fund balance of \$1,660,275 an increase of \$206,673. In 2007, the Town voted to use funds from the Undesignated Fund Balance to build a Sand/Salt Shed with the understanding that we would be reimbursed by the State at which time the funds would be returned to the Undesignated Fund. As of the writing of this letter, Sebago is currently number one on the list to be reimbursed. We are anticipating \$101,941. A healthy Fund Balance will not only enhance the financial position of the Town both in terms of the cash flow today, but also in terms of the amount available to use for unexpected emergencies.

Analysis of Significant General Fund Budget Variances

Revenues continue to be slightly higher than expected, in various areas. Excise revenues continue to be stable. Although the Town continued to budget modest amounts, tax payments for the most part have been on track.

It is the Town's hope that the State will re-visit the funding formula (EPS) as property values have lowered in the Lakes Region.

Significant Capital Assets

At the end of 2011, the Town had \$1,840,467 net investment in capital assets.

ECONOMIC FACTORS AND NEXT YEAR'S BUDGETS AND RATES

Messages were sent loud and clear to M.S.A.D. # 61 as the District's Towns rejected the school budget twice, passing it the third time by eighty-six (86) votes. One of the factors affecting the school budget is the first payment of the renovation bond for the high school is due. With reduced funds from the State, taxpayers are required to pay more.

Taxpayers at the Annual Town Meeting voted to use funds from the Engine II, Tank II, and Land Acquisition Reserve Accounts for the development of a future Fire/Rescue Building (Article 10, June 4, 2011 Annual Town Meeting). It is the hopes of the committee that a building plan and financing option will be available in the next year.

In the upcoming fiscal year the Town's Board of Selectmen, Town Manager, and Budget Committee will continue to monitor and evaluate local economic conditions keeping the following factors in mind:

- Changes in the State Education funding formula due to recent deterioration of economic conditions, both at the State and Federal levels.
- Reductions in State Revenue and Urban Rural Initiative Program (URIP)
- Continued bankruptcy and tax liens rising as a result of tough economic times
- Possibility of decreasing excise tax revenue and other non-intergovernmental revenue resources
- Increasing energy costs and other expenditures.

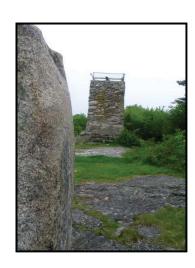

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

We wish to thank Ralph Brown for his years of service and dedication at the Transfer Station and wish him well in his retirement.

Four Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) applications prepared by Allen Crabtree were awarded and worked on this year. A CDBG grant for \$8,000 allowed renovations to be made to the town offices to improve handicap access. A second CDBG grant for \$25,000 allowed 6 more homes of Sebago elderly to be weatherized. Edie Harnden has done a great job administrating this program. The third CDBG grant for \$10,000 was awarded to allow developing options for the possible future use of Sebago Elementary School should, at some point in the future, MSAD61 elects to close the school. The Board of Selectmen appointed a citizen committee and hired a consultant to develop recommendations in this ongoing process.

The ad hoc cemetery committee held another successful clean-up day last spring. Several trees have been removed as a preventive measure to avoid damage to the cemeteries, and a fence installed at the Keniston Yard on Folly Rd. Cemetery Trust Funds have been identified and repairs will be made with the existing funds to these cemeteries.

The Douglas Mountain committee held a work day last fall. Trails were cleared, signage refreshed, and culverts and fill brought in at wet areas for easier trail use. A new sign will be in place on the tower this spring and the fence around the top replaced.

A Road Committee was formed following discussion at the last Town Meeting regarding the condition of the Town roads. The existing road plan is being updated following an extensive revaluation of all roads by committee members. Recommendations for implementing the plan and monies needed will be included in the proposed budget.

The Board of Selectmen continues to review Ordinances and policies and update as needed. The Personnel Policy changes have been approved by the Board and the Purchasing Policy is near completion. The Board brought changes to the voters to the Parking Ordinance and Town Beach Ordinance which were approved. Thanks to all the committee members who give their time to these projects.

The Board of Selectmen has been working closely with a Fire and Rescue Building Task Force and citizens to develop a proposal for a new combined fire and rescue building. A preliminary cost estimate for the building has been obtained. Three well-attended public hearings were held by the Selectmen and questions on siting and cost have been addressed. At the June 2011 town meeting voters approved funding for the site at the Shaw Brothers sand pit on Route 114 and for site development. An architect has been hired to develop plans and an engineering firm has prepared a site plan application for the Planning Board. The Planning Board held two public hearings of their own as part of their site plan review and the Planning Board has approved the site plan. Bids will be solicited for the site development work and for construction of the building. An additional public hearing will be held by the Selectmen at the June 2012 town meeting, and voters will be asked to vote on the proposed building in a referendum to be held on

June 12. If voters approve the building construction could start this summer with occupancy by spring of 2013.

CIP and Budget Committee members have worked diligently to be fiscally responsible with the taxpayer always in mind during difficult economic times.

The Office of the Town Clerk strives to deliver a high level of professionalism and customer service. We promise to protect the Municipal Records and provide reasonable access to these records. In addition, we will conduct elections to the highest level of confidence.

The Clerk's Office maintains all municipal records, including Vital Statistics, births, marriages, and deaths, and dog licenses. The Town Clerk is also responsible for the registration of Motor Vehicles, Recreational and Game licenses. I am the custodian of public records and act as the major reference resource for the past as well as the present.

MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS

New and re-registrations can be done at the Town Office. To re-register a vehicle, you must provide the previous registration the current mileage and proof of insurance. With a new registration, you are also required to present the Bill of Sale or Dealer's Sales Tax Certificate and the title paper work. Renewals can be done on-line at www.townofsebago.org. When using this process, you will need to print out the confirmation form. Your new stickers and registration will be mailed to you.

RECREATIONAL/GAME LICENSES

Hunting and Fishing licenses may be purchased from the Clerks Office. Hunting and Fishing may also be purchased on-line at www.townofsebago.org. The Clerk's Office also registers boats, snowmobiles and ATVs. Renewals can be done in the office or on-line at www.townofsebago.org. If you are coming into the office to register, please bring in your prior registration to ensure the proper boat, snowmobile or ATV is being registered. With a new registration, you are required to present the Bill of Sale or Dealer's Sales Tax Certificate.

DOG LICENSES

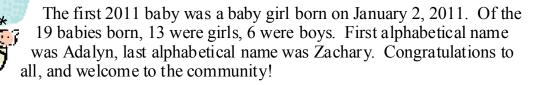
To license a dog, a current **State of Maine Rabies Certificate** must be presented. Sebago usually holds a rabies clinic in January of every year. The fee for neutered/spayed dogs is \$6.00; unneutered/unspayed is \$11.00. **All dogs six months or older must be licensed by the end of the calendar year.** A late fee of \$25.00 will be charged after February 1st of each year. This year Sebago registered 208 dogs. *The most popular breed is Labrador retriever, and the most popular color is black.*

VITAL RECORDS

The Clerks Office maintains the records of all births, marriages and deaths that occur in Sebago. RECREATION DEPARTMENT

This past year I've had a number of new residents and seasonal visitors call regarding the recreational opportunities offered in the Town of Sebago. Therefore I decided to take this opportunity to outline what is currently happening with regards to the Sebago Recreation Department.

First and foremost the department consists of one employee and relies heavily on the support of local volunteers. Volunteerism drives the local recreation programming. We offer many recreational opportunities but are only able to provide them if we have the volunteers to help. Thank you to all who have volunteered your time, treasure and talents in order to provide these recreational opportunities for residents of Sebago!!

Sebago offers the following programs locally: Soccer grades K-6, Basketball, grades 1-6 and adult open gym, baseball and softball (Sebago Youth Athletic Association)

Walking club is offered at the town hall during the fall and winter months. We are currently looking for an adult leader to supervise the gym for this program.

Adult snowshoeing is one of our largest growing programs for adults. The town has twenty-six pairs of shoes and 18 sets of poles. A number of residents and clubs have borrowed this equipment to enhance their physical activity during the winter months. This equipment is available for residents 18 years and older. The equipment was purchased with monies received from a grant to be used to increase physical activity in adults. It has been a great success! Thank-you Allen Crabtree for your continued help in administering this program.

Sebago Recreation hosts its annual Easter Egg hunt, Halloween Party and in conjunction with Sebago PTO the Town Christmas Tree lighting.

Recreation Programs shared and hosted in Bridgton and Casco are swimming lessons for children and line dancing for adults. Swimming lessons are held at Woods pond and Highland lake in Bridgton Maine in June and July. Line dancing classes were held in Casco at the Community Center in March and April.

Field Trips planned for this year are a trip to the Portland Sea Dogs, The Whales Tale Water Park. I am currently working with the Towns of Bridgton, Casco, Harrison and Standish to offer more senior trips. Check the Town Web site for future postings.

As I stated at the beginning of this report, volunteers are the key to success of this Department. I am working with members of the Sebago Community to discuss and plan future recreation programs and opportunities for the residents of Sebago. GENERAL ASSISTANCE

I was appointed General Assistance Administrator for the Town of Sebago for the fiscal year, 2010 - 2011. I previously have had experience working in the Town of Parsonsfield for almost ten years, assisting the Overseers of the Poor. It is my goal to assist those in need and at the same time save money for the Town. Implementing the State's rules and guidelines sometimes makes it extremely difficult. These rules and guidelines are updated yearly by the State, which the Town must adopt.

Sebago General Assistance hours are Thursday from 1pm to 3pm. In the case of an emergency I am more then willing to come into the office at a day and time that is more convenient for the client.

Each client needs to bring with them proof of all income and expenses for everyone in the household for the last 30 days. If they are a repeat client, and able to work, they must also bring a list of at least five places a week they have applied for work in the last 30 days.

The budget for this year was \$20,875, of this \$12,009.78 was spent. PROP received \$430.75 in wages, Electricity was \$521.83, Food was \$246.88, Heating Fuel was \$6,353.04, Household/Personal Expense was \$120.95, Rental was \$3,911.33, and Holiday Assistance was \$425.00,

My husband has built a cabinet to hold non perishable food, this is located in the kitchen at the Town Office for those who cannot get to the Food Pantry.

I look forward to be able to continue as the General Assistance Administrator for the Town in the coming years.

SENIOR WEATERIZATION PROGRAM

The Town has received 2 grants from the government for this program. So far we have helped six senior families. We have replaced roofs, windows, doors, insulation, ceilings, water heater and siding. We have worked with Lowes in Windham and they have gone above and beyond to help our Town. If you are a senior and would like help, please call the office. Also we are always looking for volunteers to help with labor.

FUEL ASSISTANCE PROGAM

This past August a bake and yard sale was held, which the people of Sebago very generously donated items. This was done with the help of several Town Officials and their families along with my husband and family. We set up tables to sell some remaining items during the November election. We donated some items for Holiday gift giving to children. Very generous money donations have been received. We have been able to have fuel delivered, oil and wood, to many families who would not have been eligible for General Assistance, they would have been considered over income according to State guidelines.

We are planning to form a committee to help with ideas to earn money for the next heating season. If anyone is interested in joining us please call the office.
