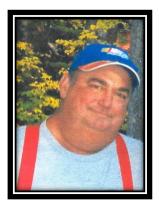

Since arriving to the U.S. Senate last January, I have been looking for ways to provide Mainers with improved access to federal services through the use of digital technology and on the ground outreach initiatives. Maine is a rural state and I know that traveling to our offices can present both logistical and financial challenges.

To help overcome those obstacles, I launched our signature **Your Government Your Neighborhood** outreach program in June 2013. Every other week members of my staff in Maine travel to different towns – ensuring that all 16 counties are served each month - to hold constituent office hours for local residents.

Over the past eleven months my work in Washington has been largely shaped by the four committees that I serve on: Armed Services, Intelligence, Budget, and Rules. These appointments allow me to engage on issues important to Maine and help craft legislation before it comes to the Senate floor. On the Armed Services Committee I work with my colleagues to honor our obligations to members of our armed forces both past and present, as well as ensure the continued strength, efficiency, and sustainability of our military. On the Intelligence Committee I work to effectively mitigate security threats facing our country while also establishing measures to guarantee that the privacy rights of U.S. citizens are protected. On the Budget Committee, I am working to ensure that necessary spending is tempered with fiscal responsibility, and my position on the Rules Committee allows me to push for procedural reforms that remove institutional inefficiencies and help move the country forward.

l am tremendously grateful for the opportunity to serve you and determined to keep you informed of my activities in Maine and Washington. Dear Friends:

It is a privilege to represent Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share some of my work from the past year.

Encouraging the creation of more jobs remains my top priority. I have developed a Seven Point Plan for Jobs in Maine, which includes proposals to spur small business investment, ensure robust workforce education and training, reduce regulatory red tape that stifles job creation, support Maine agriculture and manufacturing, and invest in the infrastructure needed to expand our economy. Traditional industries and small businesses remain the backbone of Maine's economy, and innovation will be important for future jobs as well. I have supported Maine's effort to lead the world in deepwater wind technology and was proud when the University of Maine and its private sector partners launched the first prototype this year. This emerging industry has the potential to create thousands of good jobs here in Maine.

BIW remains a major Maine employer and is critical to our national security. I have worked hard to support the Navy's request for a 10th DDG-51 and to continue construction on the DDG-1000s at the shipyard. This year's annual defense policy bill also contains more than 30 provisions to eliminate sexual assault from our military, including several provisions that I authored.

Partisan divisiveness in Washington continues to prevent us from addressing some of our nation's most serious challenges. Gridlock reached a peak in October with the federal government shutdown that pushed our country to the brink of defaulting on its financial obligations and damaged our economy. As the shutdown continued with no end in sight, I presented a proposal I believed both sides could support. Within days, I was leading a bipartisan coalition of 14 Senators that worked night and day to craft a plan to reopen government, avert default, and restart negotiations on a long-term plan to deal with our nation's unsustainable debt of more than \$17 trillion. Known as the "Common Sense Caucus," we will continue to work to develop solutions and bridge the partisan divide.

Earlier this year, across-the-board federal spending cuts known as "sequestration" took effect. These indiscriminate cuts jeopardized priorities from national security to medical research and stand in stark contrast to the thoughtful and thoroughly debated spending priorities set at town meetings throughout Maine. To bring some Maine common sense to this process, I authored bipartisan legislation to allow federal agencies to set priorities in administering the required cuts and wrote a new law to ensure that sequestration would not disrupt air travel, which plays such an important role in fueling Maine's tourism economy.

I have also enjoyed my work as the ranking member of the Senate Special Committee on Aging where, with Senator Bill Nelson of Florida, we work on issues of critical importance to Maine seniors. The committee has created a toll free hotline (1-855-303-9470) to make it easier for senior citizens to report fraud and scams and to receive assistance. I also serve as the Senate Co-Chair of the task force on Alzheimer's, a devastating disease that takes a tremendous personal and economic toll on more than five million Americans. Better treatment for Alzheimer's and ultimately finding a cure should be an urgent national priority.

Finally, I am proud to reflect our famous Maine work ethic by completing another year of service without missing a single roll call vote. I have not missed a vote since I was elected – a streak that stands at more than 5,300 in a row.

May 2014 be a good year for you, your community, and our great State of Maine.

Dear Friend,

I hope this letter finds you and your family well. It is an honor to represent you in Congress and a pleasure to update you on the work I am doing in Maine and Washington.

You are probably aware that Washington is a very challenging place to get anything done these days. The partisan climate has kept many important issues from being addressed and even led to a shutdown of the federal government. Worst of all, it has created uncertainty for Maine families and the economy. It's the last thing we need. Over the next year, I will continue pressing Congressional leaders to bring the focus back to helping people rather than advancing ideologies.

As difficult as it's been, though, there are areas where I have been able to make progress on needed policy reforms. One has been support for local food producers. For decades now, federal agriculture policy has only benefited huge farms and commodity crops, not the kind of the diverse family farms we have in Maine. It's time for that to change. With small federal changes, we can capitalize on the huge economic potential of the local food movement. I've introduced the Local Farms, Food, and Jobs Act to make some of those changes, and have been pleased to see many of these reforms gain bipartisan support.

Another issue is helping veterans who were sexually assaulted during their service. I've introduced the Ruth Moore Act—named after a Maine veteran who struggled for 23 years to get disability benefits from the Department of Veterans Affairs after she was sexually assaulted while in the military. The bill would help veterans like Ruth get the assistance they need to recover from the debilitating trauma they suffered while serving the country. The bill passed the House and now awaits consideration in the Senate.

While policy in Washington is important, so is the work my staff and I do here in Maine. My office keeps close connections to Maine communities and their leaders to make sure we're doing all we can to help them succeed. This work might include providing letters of support for federal grant applications, getting answers from federal agencies, or bringing national officials to our state to raise awareness about the good things being done here.

We also work with hundreds of constituents who have issues with federal agencies and programs. Not everyone knows that you can call your Member of Congress for this kind of thing, but it's an essential part of my responsibilities and my commitment to the people I serve. Members of my staff are experts on issues ranging from veterans benefits and IRS questions to Social Security problems and passport inquiries. They can help you navigate the process, communicate with federal agencies, and, in certain circumstances, facilitate the expediting of claims. As a state, we have taken great strides over the course of the past years.

Growing our economy, decreasing our energy costs, and improving our educational system are the priorities of my administration. Maine needs to create a pro-growth environment that encourages our businesses to create jobs. It is critical that we focus on promoting polices which support and attract new investment. To achieve this, we need to keep taxes low on our families and businesses, and find ways to increase efficiency in government while protecting our most vulnerable citizens.

Annual Report to the Town of Seabago

A Message from Senator James Hamper

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

It is an honor to represent you in the Maine Senate, and I am grateful for the opportunity.

Recently our state has experienced some encouraging economic news. Maine's unemployment rate is now at its lowest point since 2008. In fact, Maine has created 8,000 new jobs since 2010. In October, Maine was named by the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia as one of eleven states with a significant growing economy. Despite this good news, we still have a lot of work ahead of us to improve our state's business climate and create new job opportunities.

The greatest accomplishment of the Legislature this past year was paying off Maine's \$500 million hospital debt. The debt was generated by services provided to MaineCare patients at the hospital and was a burden to our state's credit rating. The Legislature eventually adopted a plan proposed by the Governor, which uses the state's liquor contract as a source of revenue to pay the debt. Maine's hospitals received final payment for this longstanding debt this fall. My service on the Health and Human Services Committee allowed me to work on this proposal very closely.

The Legislature also passed a \$6.3 billion two-year budget. This budget raised the sales tax by 10 percent and the meals and lodging tax by 14 percent. These increased taxes went into effect October 1, 2013. The Legislature adopted a sunset to the new rates, returning rates to the previous levels on June 30, 2015. However, additional legislative action could extend those rates beyond that date. The budget also increased by 20 percent the amount of taxpayer money that will be used for political campaigns for the Maine Legislature. I did not vote in favor of the budget proposal when it came before the Senate. I could not support increasing taxes on Maine families while also voting to increase taxpayer funds for political campaigns. I believe Maine families deserve their hard earned money more than political candidates running for office.

I would first like to thank the residents of Sebago for allowing me the honor of serving you in the Maine House of Representatives. It is a responsibility to be taken very seriously and I look forward to another challenging session in Augusta.

I look forward to continuing to serve on the Veterans and Legal Affairs Committee as we work on the legislation that has been submitted for our consideration. During this past session the committee worked on drafting the new 10-year State Liquor contract which was instrumental in Maine's Hospitals being paid back over \$490 million in combined state and federal Medicaid debt. Other topics the committee addressed this past session and will be continuing to work on this session include: the Maine National Guard, campaign financing and the Maine Clean Election Act, landlord-tenant laws, veteran's programs, Bureau of Alcohol and Lottery Operations, lobbyist registration, election laws, and governmental ethics.

Throughout this session, I will continue to advocate for greater government efficiency and accountability when issues concern the use of taxpayer dollars. The State continues to spend more money than it takes in, which led to a general sales tax increase and a sales tax increase on meals and lodging. We still have more work to do to slow state spending and I will continue to push for reforms so that our State lives within its means.

In addition, job creation and making Maine a better place to do business will remain top priorities of mine. Reports show that unemployment numbers have decreased because of policy changes made by the current Administration, but Maine still has much work to do to provide increased employment opportunities.

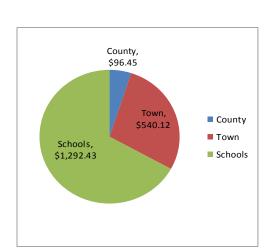

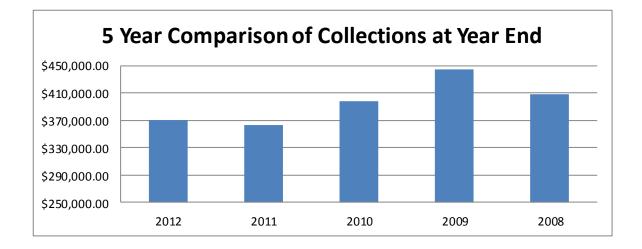

MANAGEMENTS DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS (UNAUDITED) June 2013

As Deputy Treasurer of Sebago, I offer the readers of the Town of Sebago's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Town of Sebago for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2013.

Financial Highlights

- The assets of the Town of Sebago exceeded its liabilities at the close of the most recent fiscal year by \$5,448,274 per Statement 1 (Net Position). Of this amount, \$2,133,108 (unrestricted Net Position) may be used to meet the Town's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors.
- The Town's total Net Position increased by \$98,343.
- As of the close of the current fiscal year, the Town of Sebago's governmental funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$3,348,044, an increase of \$225,843. Of this, \$1,820,997 is available for spending at the Town's discretion (unreserved fund balance) in the general fund.
- At the end of the current fiscal year, the net change in fund balance of the general fund was \$64,432 or (1%) of total general fund expenditures.

Overview of the Financial Statements

This report is intended to serve as an introduction to the Town of Sebago's basic financial statements. The Town of Sebago's basic financial statements are comprised of three components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements, and 3) notes to the financial statements.

Government-Wide Financial Statements. The *government-wide financial statements* are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the Town of Sebago's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

The *Statement of Net Position* presents information on all of the Town of Sebago's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as Net Position. Over time, increases or decreases in Net Position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the Town of Sebago is improving or deteriorating.

The *Statement of Activities* presents information showing how the Town's Net Position changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in Net Position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, *regardless of the timing of related cash flows*. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods (eg. uncollected taxes and earned but unused vacation leaves).

Both of the government-wide financial statements distinguish functions of the Town of Sebago that are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues (governmental activities) from other functions that are intended to recover all or a significant portion of their costs through user fees and charges (business-type activates). The governmental activities of the Town of Sebago include general government, public safety, public works, recreation and culture, welfare and social services. The Town does not currently report any business-type activates.

Fund Financial Statements. A *fund* is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The Town of Sebago, like other state and local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. All of the funds of the Town of Sebago consist only of governmental funds.

Governmental Funds. Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements, governmental fund financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources, as well as on balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating a government's near-term financing requirements.

Since the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for *governmental funds* with similar information presented for *governmental activities* in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term financing decisions. Both the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between *governmental funds* and *governmental activities*.

The Town of Sebago maintains three individual governmental funds. Information is presented separately in the governmental fund balance sheet and in the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances for the general fund, which is considered to be a major fund. Data from the other two governmental funds are combined into a single, aggregated presentation. Individual fund data for each of these non-major governmental funds is provided in the form of *combining statements* elsewhere in this report.

The Town of Sebago adopts and annual appropriated budget for its general fund. A budgetary comparison statement has been provided for the general fund to demonstrate compliance with this budget.

Basic governmental fund financial statements can be found on later pages of this report.

Fiduciary Funds These activities are omitted from the Town's other financial statements because the Town cannot use these assets to finance its operations. The Town is responsible for ensuring that the assets reported in these funds are used for their intended purpose.

Notes to the Financial Statements. The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements.

Other Information. The combining statements referred to earlier in connection with non major governmental funds are presented immediately following the notes to the financial statements.

Government-Wide Financial Analysis. As noted earlier, Net Position may serve over time as a useful indicator of a government's financial position.

By far, the largest portion of the Town's assets is its capital assets and cash as the largest portion of its liabilities relates to expenses and deferred revenue. Sebago saw a 3% increase in assets during the 2013 fiscal year. The Town of Sebago uses these capital assets to provide services to citizens' consequently; these assets are not available for future spending. Although the Town of Sebago's investment in its capital assets is reported net of related debit, it should be noted that the resources needed to repay this debt must be provided from other sources, since the capital assets themselves cannot be used to liquidate these liabilities.

2013 REVENUES BY SOURCE

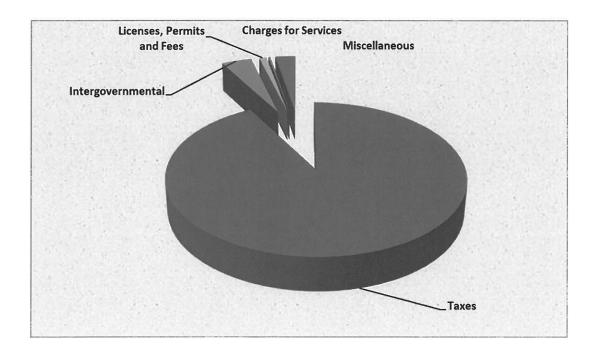


Chart A - 2013 Revenues by Source

2013 EXPENDITURES BY FUNCTION

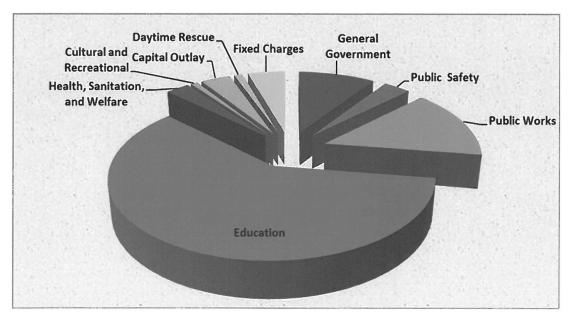


Chart B - 2013 Expenditures by Function

Analysis of Overall Financial Position and Results of Operations

Sebago's revenues exceeded expenses by \$225,843, as expenses were carefully controlled and revenues exceeded expectations. The Town budgeted revenues very conservative due to the economy, expecting to see a decrease, when in fact:

- Taxes and excise collections were fairly consistent with previous years
- Building and plumbing permits were higher than expected
- Increase in applications brought before the Planning Board
- Increase in intergovernmental funds
- Collected ordinance fines

Factors which affected a decrease in expenditures are as follows:

- General Assistance expenses were down
- Changes in Public Works personnel
- Road grading done "in house"
- Changes in the Solid Waste hauling contract

Significant Individual Fund Balances, Transactions and Changes in Fund Balance

The Town finished the year with a fund balance of \$1,820,997 an increase of \$64,432. A healthy Fund balance enhances the financial position of the Town both in terms of the cash flow and in terms of being available to use for unexpected emergencies. It is recommended to keep three times our highest month of expenditures in our Fund Balance (roughly 1.5 million). The Fund Balance also allows the Town to help defer the tax rate by paying directly with the funds instead of appropriating with taxes. We remain ever cautious, as to not place the Town in a position where a tax anticipation note will be necessary.

As of the writing of this letter, the Town of Sebago continues to wait for our reimbursement from the State for our Sand Salt Shed. We are anticipating \$101,941 which will be added to the Unassigned Fund.

Analysis of Significant General Fund Budget Variances

Revenues were budgeted conservatively due to proposed bills in the legislator. This resulted in revenues exceeding budget projections. One of these was excise, which proved to be stable in relation to previous years. Excise tax is the second highest form of revenue after taxes.

At the end of 2013, the Town had \$1,891,184 invested in capital assets.

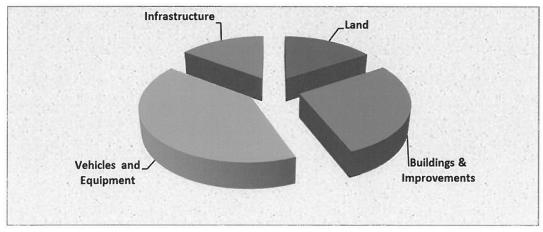

ECONOMIC FACTORS AND NEXT YEAR'S BUDGETS AND RATES

Every year the Town's Board of Selectmen, Town Manager, and Budget Committee will continue to monitor and evaluate local economic conditions keeping the following factors in mind:

- Changes in the State Education funding formula and the ever rising cost of education
- Potential reductions in State Revenue, Urban Rural Initiative Program (URIP) and other intergovernmental revenues
- Continued bankruptcy and tax liens rising as a result of the economy
- Increasing energy costs
- Potential use of the Undesignated Fund Balance to help offset the tax rate

The most difficult task that we face is to continue to offer the same services with little or no impact on taxes. The reality is that services and goods increase in costs every year. The Department Heads along with the Town Manager, Board of Selectmen, and Budget Committees make every effort in creating budgets based on needs. Vehicles and equipment are placed on a Capital Improvement Plan which allows the Town to pay cash instead of borrowing funds.

Potter Academy, the local high school, was designed by F.H. Fassett of Portland and built in 1895.



It was located on a hillside in Sebago Center as specified in the will of Dr. Joseph Fitch Potter. He required it to be built within three quarters of a mile of the Sebago Center Church and about 100 rods north of the William Fitch House.

Students from Sebago were to attend tuition free. It was expanded, with an addition in 1965 and it served the townspeople for 72 years when it closed with the formation of MSAD #61.

Ownership passed to Dr. Lowell Barnes who rented the facility to Elan1, a rehabilitation center, which occupied it until it burned in 1973.

The original diploma from Potter Academy's third graduating class.

The diploma reads: "Potter Academy, Located at Sebago, Maine, Diploma

"This certifies that Lizzie Mae Jewell Has completed the Latin Scientific Course of Study in this institution and upon proper examination is awarded this diploma as a certificate of graduation. In Testimony where of, we have here unto affixed our signatures this 15th day of June, 1899. Charles T. Stone Principal"





Commencement activities for Potter Academy, which was built in 1895, were held in various locations previous to the building of the gymnasium in 1941.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN TOWN MANAGER

he Selectmen welcomed Jim Libby to the Board in June 2013 as well as Chris Parker who was re-elected after filling an unexpired term.

Following the retirement of David Crawford as the Transfer Station Supervisor, the position was filled with two part time employees, David Twombley and Robert Fitch. This change is working well, and we thank David for his years of service.

The Road Committee Plan designated Robinson Hill Road as the next road for repairs and extensive ditching was done by Public Works. The lower portion of Robinson Hill Road was rebuilt this past summer (2,600 ft.) leaving (3,200 ft.) to do this spring. Allen Road was completed this past summer and work will be beginning on Swamp Road this year. Ditching and widening was also done on Peabody Pond Road.

Dana Batchelder served as Interim Public Works Foreman after Timothy Mayberry's departure. Thank you to both for a job very well done. Neal Farwell was hired as the new Working Public Works Director.

Cemetery repairs have been an ongoing goal for the Selectmen. The majority of broken stones have been repaired and reset by a company in North Conway. Public Works has removed several damaged trees, fixed broken fences and will place fifteen signs in various cemeteries. Repair of the wall and steps at the Poor Cemetery on Route 107 is underway with the family assuming the cost of the work.

Loon Echo has raised the \$1.4 million needed to purchase the Swamp Road property known as the Perley Mills Community Forest. The voters approved \$25,000 from the CIP Land Acquisition Fund toward this project in 2012. The Board is currently working with Loon Echo on a conservation easement to retain public access for a variety of recreational uses while conserving the natural resources of the property.

A Facilities Committee was formed by SAD 61 to assess the needs of the elementary schools. This committee consisted of Selectmen, teachers, parents and citizens from the four towns of the district. The committee met throughout the summer and evaluated the pros and cons of each school. The final report recommended voluntary redistricting for the year 2012-2013 and to consider mandatory redistricting based on school location, seat availability, and budget, if voluntary redistricting is not effective beginning in 2014-2015 as needed. There were no plans to close Sebago Elementary School and there has been no further update as of this report Thanks to Allen Crabtree for his work on this committee.

MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS

New and re-registrations can be done at the Town Office. To re-register a vehicle, you must provide the previous registration or have the vehicle identification number, year, make, model, color of the vehicle you wish to register. You must also provide the current mileage and proof of insurance. With a new registration, you are also required to present the Bill of Sale and the title paper work. *Renewals can be done on-line. When using this process, you will need to print out the confirmation form. Your new stickers and registration will be mailed to you.*

RECREATIONAL/GAME LICENSES

Hunting and Fishing licenses may be purchased from the Clerks Office. Hunting and Fishing may also be purchased on-line. The Clerk's Office also registers boats, snowmobiles and ATVs. Renewals can be done in the office or on-line. If you are coming into the office to register, please bring in your prior registration to ensure the proper boat, snowmobile or ATV is being registered. With a new registration, you are required to present the Bill of Sale.

DOG LICENSES

To license a dog, a current **State of Maine Rabies Certificate** must be presented. Sebago usually holds a rabies clinic in January of every year. The fee for neutered/spayed dogs is \$6.00; unneutered/unspayed is \$11.00. **All dogs six months or older must be licensed by the end of the calendar year.** A late fee of \$25.00 will be charged after February 1st of each year.

VITAL RECORDS

The Clerk's Office maintains the records of all births, marriages and deaths that occur in Sebago. Certified copies of these documents are available at \$15.00 for the first copy, and \$6.00 for each additional copy purchased at the same time. Under a new law, in order to obtain a certified copy, a form must be filed with proof of identification. In some cases, proof of lineage might also apply. Marriage licenses are \$40.00. License is issued where the applicants reside. Please bring identification, social security cards and proof of the dissolution of prior marriage (if necessary) when applying for a license.

REGISTRAR OF VOTERS

As of June 30, 2013 we had 388 Democrats, 448 Republicans, 61 Green Independents and 530 unenrolled voters for a total of 1,427 voters. The winter of 2013/2014 was very hard on everyone, but the Public Works Crew was ready and met the challenge head on resulting in safe roads to travel on. We appreciate everyone's patience as we strive to clear and treat the roads in a timely fashion.

Unfortunately, sometimes mailboxes fall victim to snowplows. In order to protect your mailbox from this fate, the bottom of



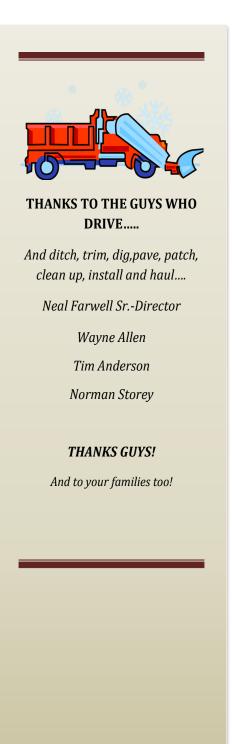
mailboxes must be set approximately 42"-48" from ground level to allow a plow wing attachment to pass under it. The upright mailbox post should be set back from the edge of pavement at least 24" with a horizontal

support extending outward to allow a mail delivery vehicle to keep its tires on the pavement and still be able to reach mailbox door. When the mailbox door is in the open position (tilted down), the outer most edge of door should be plumb with the edge of the pavement.

In addition to plowing, the crew stays active maintaining roads with ditching, patching, and sweeping. In the fall, they prepare for winter by stock piling sand & salt for next season.

The department is fortunate to have a very knowledgeable, capable, and hardworking crew, which works together as a team in getting the job done right every time.

office at a day and time that the office is opened, that is more convenient for the client.

Each client needs to bring with them proof of all income and expenses for everyone in the household for the last 30 days. Repeat clients, able to work, must also bring a list of at least five places a week they have applied for work in the last 30 days. Work search must include date, time, name of employer and who they have spoken to. All this needs to be verified.

The Town has a food cabinet which my husband built in the kitchen at the Town Office for non- perishable food to assist those who cannot get to the Food Pantry.

I look forward to be able to continue as the General Assistance Administrator for the Town in the coming years.

SENIOR WEATERIZATION PROGRAM

The Town had received a second grant from the government for this program. With this grant we have helped four senior families. Again we have replaced roofs, windows, ceilings, dry wall, and done some painting. We have worked with contractors from Sebago on these projects.

FUEL ASSISTANCE PROGAM

This program is continuing for a second year, with a gas grill that was donated by my husband and myself, which was raffled off during Town Meeting.. This past July we had George Hamm from the Comedy Connection in Portland come out and perform for us at the Town Hall. In August Camp O-AT-KA put on a Harvest Dinner for us.

We will be able to have fuel delivered, oil, gas and wood, to many families who would not have been eligible for General Assistance, they would have been considered over income according to State guidelines.

We are planning to form a committee to help with ideas to earn money for the next heating season. If anyone is interested in joining us please call the office.
